From this experience, she was led to pursue a Master of Education from Grand Canyon University, and has been able to use her knowledge and experience in many educational ventures, both locally and abroad.

Marcella currently serves as an Administrator with OneSchool Global, North America, which affords her opportunities to erect institutional change in a growing organization, as well as provide direct instruction in visual art and social-emotional development in the realm of The Zones of Regulation and Restorative Justice. She also helps to deliver STEAM enrichment opportunities through Snapology of Gig Harbor who most recently received a year-long contract to provide Expanded Learning Opportunities to 22 Tacoma Public Schools through the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation.
